he McNabb Center accepted delivery of its new mobile clinic, which will begin providing services in early winter. The project is possible thanks to a \$10 million dollar grant from the Tennessee Department of Mental Health & Substance



Abuse Services (TDMHSAS). The ultimate goal of the Mobile Clinic will be to provide mental health, substance use and primary care services to individuals in rural counties.

The program, known as Project Rural Recovery, strives is to bring behavioral services to rural Tennesseeans in need of them most. Project Rural Recovery aims to set a standard for a new model of care in rural Tennessee that brings quality and compassionate primary care and behavioral health services to Tennesseeans who are currently under-served by current mobile service methods. Once the program is fully implemented, 2,000 Tennesseans will receive care they formerly did not have access to.

BEHAVIORAL HEALTH SAFETY NET EXPANSION

he Tennessee Department of Mental Health and Substance Abuse Services expanded the state's Behavioral Health Safety Net program to include uninsured children, and the McNabb Center is proud to partner with the state on this initiative.

66 The Behavioral Health Safety Net is a foundational program to meet the mental health needs of uninsured Tennesseans, and we are so grateful to Governor Lee and the General Assembly for investing and expanding this program to our children," said TDMHSAS Commissioner Marie Williams, LCSW. "Uninsured children in any county will have the ability to get services through our community mental health providers, and that is amazing."

The McNabb Center will provide outpatient mental health care to uninsured children through the Behavioral Health Safety Net program in eight East Tennessee counties and surrounding areas: Anderson, Blount, Cocke, Hamblen, Hamilton, Knox, McMinn and Sevier. Children and their

families will have access to services including, assessment and evaluation, individual therapy, group therapy, family therapy, case management, transportation, family support services, medication management and pharmacy assistance and coordination.

It is essential to provide behavioral health care to uninsured children and we know this expansion will make a tremendous difference in the lives of kids and families," said Jerry Vagnier, McNabb Center president and CEO. "We are proud to be a community mental health center and provide care through this program."

EXPANDING SCHOOL-BASED SERVICES

he Tennessee Department of Mental health and Substance Abuse Services (TDMHSAS) is expanding its School-Based Behavioral Health Liaison program to all 95 counties in the state. The Tennessee General Assembly appropriated an increase of \$3 million budgeted by Governor Bill Lee for the current fiscal year to expand the program.

School Based Behavioral Health Liaisons provide face-toface consultation with classroom teachers who enhance learning environments for children who have or are atrisk for Serious Emotional Disturbance (SED), behavior problems or substance use disorders. Liaisons serve as a link between school and families and also provide training and education for classroom teachers.

With the COVID-19 pandemic affecting so many facets of life, there has never been a time of greater focus on the mental health of our children, youth and young adults. It is both fortunate and fortuitous that Governor Lee and the General Assembly budgeted the funding to expand this much-needed service," said TDMHSAS commissioner Marie Williams, LCSW.

The McNabb Center provides school-based services in numerous counties across East Tennessee. This expansion brings the Center's services to Sevier, Jefferson, Hamblen, Grainger, Claiborne, Union, Hamilton, Bradley, McMinn and Meigs counties.



We continue to see an increase in anxiety and other mental health concerns amongst our local youth. The need for an expansion of the School-Based Behavioral Health Liaison program could not come at a more crucial time," said Mary Katsikas, McNabb Center's Senior Director of Children and Youth Mental Health programming. "We are grateful to Governor Bill Lee and the Department of Mental Health & Substance Abuse Services for their generous support."
